FAST/ABSTINENCE LAWS OF THE SYRO-RUSSIAN ARCHDIOCESE

Syro-Russian Orthodox Catholic Christians are advised that the following are the official guidelines for fasting and abstinence in the Church. These are based on western customs and the faithful may certainly add more to these rules.

Abstinence primarily means to avoid meat products on days prescribed by the Church. Fasting primarily means to eat only one full meal with two small ones, or three half meals, on davs prescribed by the Church. On certain days prescribed there may be both fasting and abstinence required. These laws affect those who have reached the age of thirteen who are healthy and under 65 years of age – generally speaking. Children under thirteen should be taught to abstain from

something they like to teach them about honoring the fast periods. Those who need a dispensation due to health reasons should consult with their parish priest. There is no fasting or abstinence on fast-free weeks following Pascha and Christmas, during the week after the Day of Indiction (Church New Year on September 1st), and other specified Fast Periods. It is allowed to eat fish on Wednesdays during the week except during times of Strict Fast and Abstinence, e.g. Holy Week.

Wednesdays (Day of Christ's Betrayal) and Fridays (Day of Christ's Death) = Abstinence Wednesdays and Fridays during the Lenten Great Fast or Strict Fast Periods = Fast & Abstinence Advent Season = Fast Period Great Lent (40 Days of Lent) = Fast Period Great Lent – Holy Week = Strict Fast/Abstinence Period Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays after the First Sunday in Lent, of the Feast of Pentecost, of the Feast of the Holy Cross (September 14th), and December 13th = Strict Fast/Abstinence Period

Holy Week Fast = Fasting from meats and dairy products and Abstinence on all Holy Week days.



Think About It...

Moses and the people were in the desert, but what was he going to do with them? They had to be fed, and feeding 2 or 3 million people requires a lot of food.

According to the Quartermaster General in the Army, it is reported that Moses would have to have had 1500 tons of food each day. Do you know that to bring that much food each day, two freight trains, each at least a mile long, would be required! Besides vou remember, they were out in the desert, so they would have to have firewood to use in cooking the food. This would take 4000 tons of wood and a few more freight trains, each a mile long, just for one day.

And just think, they were forty years in transit. And Oh yes! They would have to have water. If they only had enough to drink and wash a few dishes, it would take 11,000,000 gallons each day and a freight train with tank cars, 1800 miles long, just to bring water!

And then another thing! They had to get across the Red Sea at night. Now, if they went on a narrow path, double file, the line would be 800 miles long and would require 35 days and nights

to get through. So there had to be a space in the Red Sea, 3 miles wide so that they could walk 5000 abreast to get over in one night.

But then, there is another problem: each time they camped at the end of the day, a campground two-thirds the size of the state of Rhode Island was required, or a total of 750 square miles long. Think of it! This much space for camping.

Do you think Moses figured all this out before he left Egypt? I think not!

You see, Moses believed in God. God took care of these things for him. Now do you think God has any problem taking care of all your needs? His love is always with you, His promises are true, And when we give Him all our cares, You know He will see us through.
